



Trinity's Sunday School



Teamwork and the sprit of serving the Lord prevailed.





LWML members handed out coffee, tea and hot chocolate, along with a large bakery muffin and a warmly worded invitation to join the Trinity family in worship during Easter and Holy Week.

The primary objective was to make non-church member school families

feel welcome and to know that Trinity Lutheran Church considers them "family." With the help of a Thrivent Action Team grant, ten LWML members - and one husband met on the Monday evening of Holy Week and packed 80 muffins individually in brown lunch bags with napkins and a "You're Family" note. Early Tuesday morning, five of the women gathered to make hot coffee, chocolate, and tea. They loaded the hot carafes, lidded cups, and condiments onto carts, and set up serving stations at student drop off points to provide parents with a morning welcome as they delivered their students to school.

Of course, the crew bagged extra muffins, and ensured that there was bottled water and fruit on hand, for those who preferred it, all the teachers, staff, and volunteers were treated, and even the election day workers serving next door in the church building's polling location received refreshments. Before calling it a day, the LWML team made and served hot cocoa with marshmallows to the entire student body.

It took Trinity's LWML quite a while to figure out their "80," but finally, hitting upon the idea, all agreed that it was the perfect project. It's almost certain that those on the receiving end think so too. The "Curbside Coffee" project will likely continue at Trinity as an ongoing annual reminder to all school families that Trinity's church members consider them FAMILY.

A big **thank you** to Trinity church members who helped prepare and serve Curbside Coffee during Holy Week. Trinity school parents and guardians were greeted with muffins and a hot drink at student drop off time with a reminder that they are considered "family" at Trinity. "You will be my witnesses"

Jesus "showed up" for 40 days after His resurrection. He walked, He talked and ate with His disciples and spent time with many others. He was a "witness" to His resurrection. 
In the book of Acts in chapter 2, it states that, after Jesus ascended into heaven, His followers were gathered together for the Feast of Harvest (which we call Pentecost), and the Holy Spirit "filled the whole house where they were sitting" Acts 2:2. "All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them" Acts 2:4.

This unusual event drew a large crowd, and Peter, no longer denying that he knew Jesus, stood up and spoke to them about repentance and the gospel of Christ (Acts 2:14). By the end of the day that the Holy Spirit came, the Church grew by 3,000 people (Acts 2:41). This is why we as believers still celebrate Pentecost... "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." Acts 1:8 Pentecost is May 23 this year.

The apostles were just like us. They were ordinary people, who enabled to speak boldly because of the Holy Spirit. We are baptized in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit will help us to witness.

Recharging Trinity's Capital Campaign: Bringing Light to Our Community

It's 2023 and we are almost back to precovid normal operations. Trinity's Capital Campaign: Bringing Light to Our Community is gearing up to get things done. As we pull out all the stops in order to bring the Gospel light of Christ to Lombard and the surrounding area. Matthew 5:16 tells us to "let your light shine before others" that they may "give glory to your Father who is in heaven." Your campaign to Bring Light to Our Community focuses on three key goals:

- 1. Trinity Lutheran School expansion and promotion. As our largest evangelism opportunity, we recognize the value of increased focus on our Lutheran school. We seek to raise at least \$15,000 to increase marketing opportunities, plus develop and stock a STEAM (science-technology-engineering-arts-math) lab to integrate into Trinity's educational curriculum.
- 2. Accessible bathrooms in church and school. Trinity desires to be accessible to people of all abilities, for worship, fellowship, and education. In

an effort to be more welcoming, and aware of people's needs, we seek to match (and hopefully exceed) a \$30,000 bequest to Trinity that is earmarked as a matching gift for long overdue bathroom remodeling.

3. A new, modern LED sign at the intersection of Roosevelt and Meyers Rd. Trinity sits at a very busy intersection, passed by over 100 thousand vehicles daily. We seek to raise a minimum of \$20,000 to build and install a bright LED church monument sign at this high-volume intersection to promote the ministry of Trinity Lutheran Church and School and continue proclaiming Christ to the community.

Giving quietly over the last three years, you have already raised almost \$37,000. With a base target of \$65,000, you can help make these goals a reality. Architectural designs for the bathrooms are complete and artist renderings in hand. The bathrooms have been bid out by contractors and a start date for remodeling will be set as soon as we can collective raise the amount needed to begin the project.

Redeeming Life Maternity Home & the LCMS Million Dollar Life Match

Thanks to all who have contributed to the Trinity-led project to raise \$5,000 for Redeeming Life Outreach Ministries' new area maternity home. Trinity agreed to be the "named congregation" working in partnership with other churches from

Circuits 6 and 15 in applying for a Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod Million Dollar Life Match Grant.

Efforts began in November 2022, when Trinity and three other congregations gave Redeeming Life a complementary booth at their holiday craft shows to sell donated goods.

Trinity then hosted a fundraising brunch on April 15, which welcomed women from 10 different congregations who tied

fleece baby blankets and put together



"pamper" kits for new and expectant moms, complete with hand colored

(Lutheran Women in Mission) notecards. This project was also part of the Northern Illinois District district-wide SHINE service project. Finally, on April 23, Trinity

collected a door offering to support the maternity home. A total of \$5,350



was raised for Redeeming Life Outreach Ministries' Northern Illinois maternity home, and if matched by synod – that number will grow to \$10,530. What a blessing! Thanks for making it happen.

Recyclable materials accepted include electronics, glass jars, aluminum cans, plastic bottles and containers, paper, cardboard, and scrap metal. NOTE: The following electronics are among those accepted at no charge monitors, printers, desktops, laptops, servers, UPS batteries, networking equipment, routers, switches, and WIFI access points. However, the State of Illinois requires charges for:

microwaves (\$15), TVs - flat screened or tube (\$37), old CRT tube monitors (\$37), large upright copy machines (\$75). If you require a certificate of destruction, that can be provided within 7 days of the pick-up. Medical sharps in appropriate containers will also be accepted.

WHY YOUR STUDENTS HAVE A RIGHT TO SIT AT A DESK IN TRINITY LUTHERAN SCHOOL

In September of 2005, on the first day of school, Martha Cothren, a History teacher at Robinson High School in Little Rock Arkansas, did something not to be forgotten. On the first day of school, with the permission of the school superintendent, the principal and the building supervisor, she removed all of the desks in her classroom.

When the first period kids entered the room they discovered that there were no desks.

'Ms. Cothren, where are our desks?'

She replied, 'You can't have a desk until you tell me how you earn the right to sit at a desk.'

They thought, 'Well, maybe it's our grades' 'No,' she said.

'Maybe it's our behavior.' She told them, 'No, it's not even your behavior.'

And so, they came and went, the first period, second period, third period. Still no desks in the classroom. Kids called their parents to tell them what was happening and by early

afternoon television news crews had started gathering at the school to report about this crazy teacher who had taken all the desks out of her room.

The final period of the day came and as the puzzled students found seats on the floor of the desk-less classroom. Martha Cothren said, 'Throughout the day, no one has been able to tell me just what he or she has done to earn the right to sit at the desks that are ordinarily found in this classroom

'Now I am going to tell you.'



At this point,
Martha Cothren
went over to the
door of her
classroom and
opened it. Twentyseven (27) U.S.
Veterans, all in
uniform, walked
into that classroom,

each one carrying a school desk. The Vets began placing the school desks in rows, and then they would walk over and stand alongside the wall. By the time the last soldier had set the final desk in place those kids started to understand, perhaps for the first time in their lives, just how the right to sit at those desks had been earned.

Martha said, 'You didn't earn the right to sit at these desks. These heroes did it for you. They placed the desks here for you. They went halfway around the world, giving up their education and interrupting their careers and families so you could have the freedom you have Now, it's up to you to sit in them. It is your responsibility to learn, to be good students, to be good citizens. They paid the price so that you could have the freedom to get an education. Don't ever forget it.'

By the way, this is a true story. And this teacher was awarded the Veterans of Foreign Wars Teacher of the Year for the State of Arkansas in 2006. She is the daughter of a

WWII POW.


Let us always remember the men and women of our military and the rights they have won for us.

Aír Fryer Roasted Míní Potatoes



Ingredients

- 1 lb. baby (mini) potatoes
- 2 tbsp.
- olive oil
- 1 tsp. garlic salt
- 1 tsp. Italian seasoning
- black pepper to taste

Directions:

Cut all mini potatoes in half – no need to peel or cook.

Put olive oil in small bowl along with the garlic salt, Italian seasoning, black pepper. Add potatoes to the bowl and mix around until all the potatoes are coated with oil and seasonings.

Add all of the potatoes to the air fryer using a large, slotted spoon to keep seasoning on and not add extra oil to the air fryer. It's okay if there is more than one layer. Cut-side up is best.

Set the temp to 400 and timer for 15 minutes. Check potatoes with a fork for tenderness and add more time if needed.



Know the Red Flags for Scams

The most common types of scams will target you through fake emails, text messages, voice calls, letters or even someone who shows up at your front door unexpectedly. No matter which technique the scammer uses, you may be:

- Contacted unexpectedly by phone, email, text, direct message or pop-up with a request for personal information or money. Never click a link or download an attachment from someone you don't know.
- Pressured to act immediately with an alarming phone call, email or text that plays with your emotions. Scammers may pose as an employee from a familiar organization. Do not act unless you have verified the person

- who has contacted you and the story or request is legitimate.
- Asked to pay in an unusual way, like gift cards, bitcoin, prepaid debit cards or digital currency.
- Asked to provide personal or account information, such as an account verification code, bank account number or PIN.
- Offered a free product or 'get rich quick' opportunity that seems too good to be true? If something sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Never cash a check for someone you don't know.
