Martin Luther King, Jr. Civil Rights Champion

Martin Luther King Jr. was born on January 15, 1929. He was a man of speech and action. Rev. King would talk about freedom for the African Americans and civil rights for all. His speeches were very descriptive. "I have a dream," is his



most famous. In that appearance, He referenced both Abraham Lincoln and the Bible and spoke on an America where people would "not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character." When Rev. King spoke to the people, they loved his words about the history of African Americans changing and going down as the "most memorable thing in the world." He declared, "Faith is taking the first step even when you don't see the whole staircase." Rev. King's wife, Coretta Scott King, was an American author. She joined her husband in advocating for civil rights and appeared in multiple documentaries about her life and activism and that of her husband. Supportive of her husband's work throughout their marriage, she continued his civil rights quest after his assassination on April 4, 1968. He is remembered for his great passion, his powerful words, and his understanding that God created all people equal.


