



What you listen to, and what you hear, has a profound effect on what you believe

The following article is a good example of just that fact. "As long as they believe in God, it's okay." That statement has been made by many people. Many believe that we all worship the "same" God but by different names. People who we put in charge of the government and agencies that make decisions for the nation, those writing the school curriculums that are educating our children are all affected by what they believe and who they believe in. BUT, who they believe God is, makes all the difference in their own Salvation, and it makes a profound difference in how we live in this nation and in this world. Does what we do in our government, honor God? Does what we teach our children, honor God?

JULY 24, 2023 by Matthew Emadi Early in pastoral ministry, I became a police chaplain for the department of Sandy, Utah. I didn't last long.

The head chaplain was a Mormon, and he wanted all the chaplains to unite together

regularly for prayer. When I explained to him that I couldn't do so because we didn't worship the same God, he was shocked I'd say such a thing. He didn't understand that using the same terms—God the Father, Son of God, <u>Jesus Christ</u>, Holy Ghost—didn't mean we meant the same thing.

This gave me an opportunity to explain why the God of the Bible isn't the God of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (LDS) and to make it clear that we weren't praying to, worshiping, or trusting the same God at all.

What, then, do Mormons believe about God? Here are two pillars of their doctrine of God: (1) God the Father is an exalted man and (2) each person of the Godhead is a distinct and separate god.

'As Man Is Now, God Once Was' Mormons believe God the Father once existed as a man. In an 1844 sermon known as the King Follett discourse, Joseph Smith (the founder of Mormonism) said, "God himself was once as we are now, and is an exalted man, and sits enthroned in yonder heavens!" He went on to say that God "was once a man like us; yea, that God himself, the Father of us all, dwelt on an earth."

Even now in God's exalted state, Smith claimed, God has a body like ours: "If you were to see him today, you would see him like a man in form—like yourselves in all the person, image, and very form as a man." Mormon scriptural canon confirms Smith's teaching: "The Father has a body of flesh and bones as tangible as man's" (Doctrine and Covenants 130:22).

If God the Father used to be a man, where did he come from? According to LDS authorities, he came from *his* father. Orson Pratt, one of the early Mormon apostles, wrote, We were begotten by our Father in heaven; the person of our Father in heaven was begotten on a previous heavenly world by His Father; and again, He was begotten by a still more ancient Father; and so on, from generation to generation, from one heavenly world to another still more ancient.

Mormons believe there are many worlds with many gods. These gods have children who populate their worlds and can progress toward deification.

The path toward divine exaltation is the goal of every Mormon. Lorenzo Snow, the fifth president of the LDS church, summarized Mormonism's doctrines of God and deification with one of the most recognizable <u>quotes</u> from a Mormon leader: "As man is now, God once was; as God is now man may be."

Mormonism teaches that worthy Mormon men may follow the same path as Heavenly Father ("the law of eternal progression"). They can evolve from preexistence to mortal human existence to divine exaltation. Women too may achieve celestial exaltation, becoming like Heavenly Mother, the wife of God the Father, though the LDS church <u>admits</u> their knowledge of Heavenly Mother is limited.

In sum, the LDS God (Heavenly Father) is an exalted man who once lived on a planet like ours. He achieved celestial exaltation, exists with a physical body in the celestial realm, has Heavenly Mother as his eternal wife, and populates our planet with his children.

This is enough to establish Mormonism as a polytheistic religion. Still, most Mormons would reject that label; they claim that while they recognize the existence of other gods, they give their worship only to the God of our world. This God, according to Mormonism, is part of a Godhead consisting of three distinct and separate beings: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost.

The path toward divine exaltation is the goal of every Mormon. Bruce R. McConkie, a Mormon apostle in the 1970s and early 1980s, explained, "Three separate personages—the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost—comprise the Godhead. As each of these persons is a God, it is evident, from this standpoint alone, that a plurality of Gods exists." Joseph Smith similarly claimed Christian trinitarianism is a "popular but erroneous doctrine" and instead referred to the Godhead as "three distinct personages and three Gods."

The official LDS website contains an <u>article</u> titled "Becoming Like God," which states, "Latter-day Saints also believe strongly in the fundamental unity of the divine. They believe that God the Father, Jesus Christ the Son, and the Holy Ghost, *though distinct beings*, are unified in purpose and doctrine" (emphasis mine).

Mormonism claims to worship only one God, but they mean one in purpose—not in being.

The LDS chaplain of the police department failed to recognize that the Bible's doctrine of God and Mormonism's doctrine of God are mutually exclusive—they cannot both be true. As the Creator God explicitly declares through the prophet Isaiah, "Before me no god was formed, nor shall there be any after me" (Isa. 43:10). And similarly in Isaiah 45:5, God says, "I am the LORD, and there is no other, besides me there is no God."

**With the universal Christian Church, the LCMS teaches and responds to the love of the Triune God: the Father, creator of all that exists; Jesus Christ, the Son, who became human to suffer and die for the sins of all human beings and to rise to life again in the ultimate victory over death and Satan; and the

Holy Spirit, who creates faith through God's Word and Sacraments.

The three persons of the Trinity are coequal and coeternal, one God. Being "Lutheran," our congregation accepts and teaches Biblebased teachings of Martin Luther that inspired the reformation of the Christian Church in the 16th century.

The teaching of Luther and the reformers can be summarized in three short phrases: Grace alone, Faith alone, Scripture alone.


- **Grace alone** God loves the people of the world, even though they are sinful, rebel against Him and do not deserve His love. He sent Jesus, His Son, to love the unlovable and save the ungodly.
- Faith alone By His suffering and death as the substitute for all people of all time, Jesus purchased and won forgiveness and eternal life for them. Those who hear this Good News and believe it have the eternal life that it offers. God creates faith in Christ and gives people forgiveness through Him.
- Scripture alone The Bible is God's inerrant and infallible Word, in which He reveals His Law and His Gospel of salvation in Jesus Christ. It is the sole rule and norm for Christian doctrine.

Christians have rightly confessed through the centuries that the only living and true God is triune—one God who exists as three coeternal, coequal persons: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Each person of the Godhead is fully God. They're identical in essence and equal in power and glory.

Only this triune God, revealed in the pages of his Word, is worthy of our worship. Only this God can save us from our sins. And only this God can hear our prayers.

This is why studying God's Word is important. This is why knowing the one TRUE God is what is taught in the Lutheran Church, our Lutheran School, Adult Bible Classes and Sunday School at Trinity.



GIFTS FROM THE HEART

GIFTS FROM THE HEART thru the Voice of Hope Behind the Wall Ministry NID has evolved

in the past three years reports Deaconess Lori Wilbert. After 34 years of working behind the wall at Stateville Prison and working in ministry within the Northern Illinois District for 38 years, Deaconess Wilbert has transitioned into working with those being released from prison in the Illinois Dept. of Corrections. The teaching ministry at Stateville continued during the Covid shut down with the blessing of the warden and with staff he assigned to the ministry. Prison staff delivered class lessons and assignments to the cell houses each week, picked them up, and sent them back to Deaconess Wilbert. This teaching model continues. As a result, there is time to assist those coming home from prison,

something NOT allowed previously in Illinois. The blessing and gift of ministry with those being released has become a part of the transitional journey on which these men are about to embark. Some of these individuals were part of the teaching ministry in the past. Things have come full circle!

Deaconess Wilbert will provide spiritual counseling along with practical advice on making choices, finding employment, repairing family relationships and the challenges of leaving an environment of negativity, confinement and isolation. To have freedom after 20 to 30 years of being locked up can be an arduous journey in and of itself. The church can be there for these men coming home. The church has a message of hope, grace and forgiveness. Upon their release, former prisoners need items that help an individual set up an apartment. These Gifts from the Heart will enable each person to have a solid start as he re-integrates into his community.

baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit" (Acts 1:4-5).



Rest in His goodness and grace.



Lutheran Women's Missionary League Convention Report

40th Biennial Convention was held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League, also known as Lutheran Women in Mission, welcomed over 3,500 people to their 40th biennial convention in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, June 22–25, 2023, under the theme "Celebrate the Lord of the Nations." The convention theme was based on Psalm 33:12–13.

2023-2025 Mission Goal and Mission Grants

The Lutheran Women in Mission voting body adopted a \$2,350,000 mission goal for the 2023–2025 biennium. This goal, by the grace of God, will fund 31 mission grants, as women and men respond in prayer and mite offerings during the next two years.

Lori Solyom, one of the attendees from Trinity said:

One of my favorite parts of the convention was the parade of international flags, followed by all of the children and workers from Camp Celebration...I just kept hearing Jesus' words, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations," from Matthew 28:19, and "Let the little children come to me..." from Matthew 19:14.

It was also pretty exhilarating to stand on the stage on Sunday morning as part of the host committee as all of the volunteer workers from the Northern Illinois District, and North and South Wisconsin Districts filled the front of the auditorium. It was a real, "wow, we did it!" moment.

I have never laughed so hard as I did during the Lutheran Ladies Lounge Family Feud game when Erin asked for the top things to add to Jell-O and Jan Struck piped up with "the correct color of the liturgical season." Oh my!

Lori, Arlene, Ann, Hannah and Rachel were blessed by their participation.

LCMS New evangelism module addresses witnessing to Jehovah's Witnesses

Every One His Witness® (E1HW) is The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) resource for equipping Lutherans to share the Gospel with the people they encounter in their everyday lives.

Since the launch of *E1HW* in 2017, modules have been released on witnessing to a wide array of people who need to hear God's Word: Muslims, "Nones," LGBTQ people, Jewish people, those who have left the church, those influenced by critical theory, those who struggle with depression or grief, and those

who are dealing with the consequences of abortion.

Now, a new *E1HW* module is available: "Witnessing to Jehovah's Witnesses." The introduction to the module notes that "many people are familiar with the Jehovah's Witnesses because of their active evangelism efforts" as they go door-to-door in neighborhoods and disseminate printed material in public spaces. The module encourages faithful Christians, rather than hiding from Jehovah's Witnesses or avoiding conversations with them, to see interactions with them as "opportunities to bring the Good News to people oppressed by the burdens of the Law and false teachings about Jesus."

The new module, like past modules, makes use of the LASSIE approach to witnessing, which is the foundation of the *E1HW* program: Listen, Ask, Seek, Share, Invite and Encourage. The LASSIE approach is presented in depth in the program's core module, which is available at no cost at everyonehiswitness.org.
