previously scheduled days off. We are committed to the children as well


as the parents as we work thru this time of health challenges.

RESURRECTION GARDEN (to keep or share)

– For each Resurrection Garden you will need:

- Sharpie marker or paint pen to write on rock
- A smooth light-colored rock small enough to nestle on plate
- A small plate, bowl, or box - any kind (4" to 7" inches in diameter works best)
- Glue (craft glue or adult-supervised hot glue works best)
- A handful of Spanish moss, paper shreds or Easter basket grass
- A few cloth or paper flowers
- Two wooden craft or popsicle sticks, twigs, chop sticks, wooden skewers, or straws
- String, twine, ribbon, or twist tie (i.e. from a bag of produce)
- Small index card or paper square
- Pen or marker to write on card

Instructions:

1. With Sharpie marker or paint pen, write the words "Jesus Lives" or "He Lives" on one side of rock.
2. Glue rock securely in bowl or plate, with the words on top and visible.
3. Surround rock with Spanish moss, paper shreds, or Easter basket grass and glue in place.
4. Decorate with cloth or paper flowers, nestling and gluing into "grass."
5. Use string or twist tie to make a cross of two sticks or straws and secure next to rock, gluing in place.

6. Use pen or marker to write on index card or paper square: **[Jesus said,] "I am the resurrection and the life." John 11:25**
7. Nestle and glue card or paper into garden.

READ THE EASTER STORY –

Find it in the Gospels - Matthew 27 & 28, Mark 15 & 16, Luke 23 & 24, and John 19 & 20. Use an age-appropriate children's Bible such as the Faith Alive Bible from Concordia Publishing House (it's the version we give children 3rd grade and up at Trinity). Don't have a Bible handy? Sunday School: Help Needed in the Fall

Adult and youth members of Trinity Lutheran Church are invited to prayerfully consider serving with Sunday School. At Sunday School, children from age 3 through 8th grade hear weekly that Jesus loves them. Bible stories and lessons illustrate how God the Father created us, sent His Son Jesus Christ to die for us and rise again, and sends us the Holy Spirit to help us live daily in Christ. Simple snacks are served. Crafts, activities, and mission service projects help student apply the Biblical truths learned.

Disruption and Security: A Perspective on Stewardship

Scanning the internet for the latest news amidst the coronavirus – COVID-19 pandemic, paying particular attention to the Christian response, I was struck by several realizations:

While our day-to-day routines may have been disrupted, our deeply and sincerely held Christian beliefs, and the behaviors they foster, have not. We continue to:

Put our trust in God – *“Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go.”* Joshua 1:9

When the world around us seems to spiral out of control, we can ask God to give us extra servings of grace and patience for others. This marks us as different and helps us bear witness to the love of Christ.

Love one another – *“By this all people will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another.”* John 13:35

Throughout history, Christians have stood out because they showed up at times of crisis and put the well-being of others before their own. From an AD 251 plague that decimated the Roman Empire to the cholera outbreak in 19th century England, Christians have regularly been the first on the scene and the last to leave. Today, in Wuhan, China, the virus' epicenter, Christians are actively ministering to all.

We can model the Father's love by running essential errands for those at risk, sending kind notes, or making calls of encouragement. These small acts can be a lifeline for those who are isolated and alone. The Holy Spirit will present opportunities for us to serve as Jesus' hands and feet.

What does this mean for our Christian Stewardship?

As to how this effects our stewardship...in chaotic times, we must remember that God

is the giver of all we have. He is the provider of our needs – often through His people. During good times and bad, His Church stands.

Our earthly schedules may have been disrupted, yet God’s timing is always perfect.

March 22 was planned as our annual *Trinity Commitment Sunday*. God allowed some of us to worship together via the miracle of technology with a livestreamed service, but we could not physically gather in God’s house – therefore turning in our Giving Commitments for the 2020-2021 Fiscal Year was an impossibility. We ask that you either mail your *Giving Commitment* envelopes to Trinity Lutheran Church, 1165 S Westmore-Meyers Rd, Lombard, IL 60148, or bring them to submit when we are able to resume our regular in-person worship.

March 29 was the day we were to receive materials to help us begin a new initiative, *Bringing Light to Our Community*. This capital campaign seeks our response to God’s love in the form of financial gifts, large and small, dedicated to promoting and enhancing the church and school, making Trinity’s facilities more accessible to all, and acquiring new highly-visible signage for our busy intersection. Your Board of Stewardship will provide more information and materials to facilitate participation in *Bringing Light to Our Community* when we are able to return to typical worship and fellowship at Trinity.

Pray for those who have critical needs, are struggling with illness, fear, layoffs, economic setbacks, isolation, depression, or


sadness. May the Lord provide comfort, succor, and assurance to all in time of need or distress.

Sanctity of All Life

in the Shadow of Coronavirus

What has the sanctity of life to do with pandemics and cancellations? Believe it or not, it's more relevant than ever. The Gospel of Jesus Christ belongs to just such a time as this. It prepares us for precisely these kinds of moments. Here's how we can keep speaking truth, showing love, and sharing life in the face of the coronavirus and cultural distress.

Let's not abort the unborn. Some will use this virus as the latest excuse to experiment with embryos for developing another vaccine or a stem-cell therapy. Do we have to let the emergency turn our little ones into nothing more than spare parts? One abortionist already advocated removing restrictions on RU486 because increased time at home equals more surprise pregnancies. Widespread dread provides the least rational and most hazardous justification for medically cannibalizing our young.

Let's not abandon the elderly. We can allocate healthcare resources, even in crisis, according to urgency of needs and not duration of years. Quality of life is in the eye of the beholder, which makes a poor basis for assessing survival. This outbreak already especially endangers the aged. Sacrificing them to it will embolden, not appease it.

Reconsider the role of our bodies. Disease transmission reminds us of some wonderful realities. A person's value means more than how attractive or productive we find her. Comfort, luxury, and indulgence do not trump everything else. There's no such thing as a personal choice or a private decision. We affect others wherever we go and whatever we do—for worse and for better. These bodies are gifts, not rights or burdens.

Behold how defenseless and dependent we are. But for the grace of God, we cannot sustain ourselves against the tiniest menaces. Humankind's selfishness long ago upset the harmony our Almighty Maker wove into the universe, and we have competed with creation ever since. Microscopic organisms have turned against us too ("cursed is the ground because of you"). Sin has rendered us little and feeble like an embryo, impaired and compromised as much as any hospital patient. Yet our heart beats and eyes blink—how relentlessly does the Heavenly Father preserve us!

Take comfort that no one suffers alone. Our Lord Jesus Christ has borne our sicknesses and carried our sorrows. He knows weeping and bleeding. The Son of God humbled Himself under hurt and obedient to death to walk its valley alongside us. His crucified forgiveness has emptied suffering of any punishment and filled it with purposes. In His hand even our pain accomplishes outcomes that far surpass its costs.

Let's celebrate community. What an unprecedented opportunity we have in school closings, travel restrictions, and working from home (or furloughs). Families, locales, and countries could unite in ways our fast-paced culture doesn't usually facilitate. Lean in to the household. Play board games. Read stories aloud. Reach out to aging relatives. Catch up with old friends. Check in on isolated neighbors. Use phone, email, letters, and cards when visits become inadvisable. Engage in real conversation with your husband or wife. How can we serve those whom the quarantining affects most adversely?

Let's do more patting on the back than finger-pointing. Contagions can make us suspicious of each other. Distances and differences can further impede goodwill. Practice patience rather than complaining, even with government officials, and commending instead of condemning, even with overseas populations. We're going to need one another in order to overcome both this peril and its opportunistic secondary infection: disrupted relationships.

Resist the temptation to fill the extra time with screens. No media delivers just the facts (or distractions). They sell products and philosophies, and scares and stories sell even more than sex. Seek truth rather than news ("infotainment" which often consists mostly of rumors and exaggerations). Rather than resorting to technology and toys, dive headlong into what your mind and heart really crave—connecting with fellow human beings.

Remember the hope of a new creation. Whatever this world robs from us, the resurrection of the body will restore. Pray not just to be spared from sickness but to be liberated from sin. Pray not only for ourselves but for our every neighbor. Pray, watch, and await with eager anticipation the day when God shall wipe away every tear from your eyes and there will be no more disease.

Let's demonstrate the best of humanity and make the coronavirus pandemic of 2020 the most life-affirming, Gospel-motivated event of our age!

Recipes



Recipes Passed Down

Ginny Wilson

Ginny Wilson, who turned 95 in March, always contributed her ‘special’ cake when honoring family members at funerals.

It came to be known as Ginny’s ‘Funeral Cake’.

She passed the recipe on to Vince Cuchetto, who now calls it the ‘Restoration Cake’.

Ingredients:

- 1 - Jiffy Yellow cake mix 9 oz pkg
- 1 - large pkg of vanilla pudding
- 1 - 8 oz pkg cream cheese (softened)
- 2 – 20 oz cans of crushed pineapple (drained)
- 1 - 8 oz tub cool whip

Mix cake mix together using ingredients on box and following directions, but substitute milk instead of water. Bake 15 minutes at 350 in a 9 x 13 greased, baking pan (cake will be very thin). Prepare pudding using ingredients listed on box, and according to instructions on box. Blend room temperature, cream cheese into pudding and set aside in refrigerator. Let the cake cool down while pudding is setting. After cake is cooled, scoop and spread, pudding /cream cheese mixture evenly over the top of the cake. Spoon drained pineapple onto pudding mixture trying to get it even across cake. Finally, spread cool whip across the top of the pineapple. Enjoy!

Suggested by Beth Kraegel:

Talking to your child or grandchild about salvation (*gleaned from Focus on the Family*):

As a parent, you have the privilege of introducing your child to God’s saving grace available through Christ’s death and

Resurrection. Here are a few tips to help you make an eternal impact on your child. First, you must introduce your child to "who God is." Start reading them Bible stories from a young age. Teach your child about God's promises and that He loves us. As your child grows, make sure he or she understands the gospel and knows who Jesus is. When the time is right (you'll know when) ask your child why Jesus died on the cross. Discuss his death and resurrection and why it was necessary. Also talk about God's forgiveness and love.


