Dear Partners in the Gospel and the Lord's Church,

"What's next?" Many of us have a found ourselves asking that question in many circumstances, including recent COVID challenges.

But before we despair, disengage, become bitter or lose heart, we are reminded, "He (Christ) is before all things, and by him all things hold together." (Colossians1:17) We are being held together, and you and I are being held in the blood stained hands of Jesus. We rejoice in His eternal promises. No wonder we are hope-filled and grateful. I sincerely thank you for all the time, effort and wrestling over the last year and now again. Your labor is not in vain. (I Corinthians 15:58)

While not always obvious, we ask "What is in the best interest of the congregation and those who gather?" Never far away is, "How does this decision effect not only my personal perspective but also my neighbor whom I love in Christ?" As hard as it can be, there are times we need to set aside our personal opinions for the sake of others. We do not set aside the Word of God!

Governor Pritzker mandated, effective August 30, 2021, that face masks will be mandatory, regardless of one's vaccine status, in all public indoor spaces throughout the state. We have been in direct contact with the Illinois Department of Public Health and have been informed that the mandate does include houses of worship. In all our conversations with the Alliance for Defending Freedom, we have heard that it is their understanding that there is not a religious liberty issue when dealing with mask wearing in public worship or in our Lutheran Schools.

We are regularly praying for good government.

Included in the Governor's orders is a mandate that school workers either be vaccinated or submit to a weekly COVID test to show they are not carrying the virus. As always, we would urge, in Christian love and care for our neighbor, that each of us would respect the health decisions of each person, as they determine whether they will be vaccinated or undergo weekly screenings.

The Northern Illinois District contacted Alliance for Defending Freedom (ADF) with some specific questions given to us by church and school representatives related to the Governor's Executive Orders on August 26, 2021. (The ADF is an organization that strives to ensure religious freedoms continue.)

I'll end with these engaging words: "Christ be my Leader by night as by day; Safe through the darkness for He is the way. Gladly I follow, my future His care, Darkness is daylight when Jesus is there." (LSB 861 st. 1) With you, my eyes are on Jesus, Hebrews 12:2,3



September 25 – 9 a.m. – 2:30 p.m. at Good Shepherd Church Elginin person and online featuring Redeeming Life Outreach Ministries


An optional meal has been added along with afternoon activities for in-person attendees





Slow Cooker Baked Zítí

Too hot to cook but you crave some Italian food.



Try this easy recipe.

It goes against everything you ever learned about cooking pasta. Feel free to pick your favorite sauce.

Ingredients:

- Cooking spray
- 1 pound dried ziti pasta
- 48 ounces marinara sauce
- 1 (15-ounce) container whole milk ricotta cheese
- 2 cups shredded low-moisture mozzarella cheese, divided

Directions:

- 1. Coat a 6-quart or larger slow cooker with cooking spray. Add the ziti, marinara, ricotta, and 1 cup of the mozzarella cheese, and stir well to combine. Sprinkle with the remaining 1 cup of mozzarella.
- 2. Cover and cook until the pasta is cooked through and the cheese is melted, on the LOW setting for 3 to 4 hours or on the HIGH setting for 1 to 2 hours. Serve immediately.

If you have been wondering why there is such animosity from young adults toward this country, there is an explanation. Apart from the idea that history repeats itself, the enemy of God has been running rampant and we are being given warnings. There are many reasons that young adults are going away from God. just two of them. #1. This article is from the New York Times paper.

Greg Epstein is the *New York Times*-bestselling author of *Good Without God: What a Billion Nonreligious People Do Believe*. Since 2005, he's served as a

Humanist Chaplain at Harvard University—
an institute that was founded by Puritans, with the intention of educating the aspiring clergy. The school's original motto was "Truth for Christ and the Church."

And now, the university's 40+ chaplains — each representing a different religious community — have unanimously elected Epstein as the new Chief Chaplain.

From the **New York Times**:

"Maybe in a more conservative university climate there might be a question like 'What the heck are they doing at Harvard, having a humanist be the president of the chaplains?" said Margit Hammerstrom, the Christian Science chaplain at Harvard. "But in this environment it works. Greg is known for wanting to keep lines of communication open between different faiths."

The dozens of students whom Mr. Epstein mentors have found a source of meaning in the school's organization of humanists, atheists and agnostics, reflecting a broader trend of young people across the United States who increasingly identify as spiritual but religiously nonaffiliated. That trend might be especially salient at Harvard; a <u>Harvard Crimson survey</u> of the class of 2019 found that those students were two times more likely to identify as atheist or agnostic than 18-year-olds in the general population. * They are more likely to be anti-American,

A new study has found that over 60% of born-again Christians in America between the ages of 18 and 39 believe that Jesus isn't the only way to Heaven — and that Buddha and Muhammad also are valid paths to salvation, the <u>Christian Post reported</u>

The outlet — citing the <u>results</u> of Probe Ministries' Religious Views & Practices Survey — also said that for those in that age group, over 30% say they either believe that Jesus sinned just like other people or aren't sure.

#2. In addition, the Christian Post said the study shows a "striking decline" in evangelical religious beliefs and practices over the last decade. The study added that the percentage of selfproclaimed believers who now hold to pluralism has gone up.

More from the outlet:

The study, which interviewed 3,100
Americans ages 18 to 55 in 2020 and looked at various other previous studies, saw a drop in "basic biblical worldview" — God's attributes, the accuracy of the Bible, salvation and Jesus being sinless — from 47% in 2010 to 25% in 2020 among born-again Christians.

The drop in the "expanded biblical worldview" — beliefs about Satan and morals being objective — went from 32% in 2010 to 16% in 2020.

"So, the percentage of Born Again Christians with a biblical worldview (of either type) has been cut in half over the last decade," the study says, according to the Christian Post, adding that it compared the 18-29 age group from 2010 with the same age group 10 years later, now 30-39. "This result is a startling degradation in worldview beliefs of born-again Christians over just 10 years."

Kerby Anderson, president of Probe Ministries, said that means even bornagain Christians "can have a false view of Jesus Christ and embrace a pluralistic worldview" and that "pastors and church leaders just can't assume any longer that the members of their church or Christian organization have a biblical worldview," the outlet reported.

The Christian Post said Anderson attributes the disturbing fall of biblical views — especially among younger Christians — to the media.


He said they are "not paying attention" and are "focused — nearly exclusively, it seems — on their phones, social media and other content they deem more compelling," the outlet said.

Lutherans believe that humans are saved from their sins by God's grace alone (Sola Gratia), through faith alone (Sola Fide), on the basis of Scripture alone (Sola Scriptura). Orthodox Lutheran theology holds that God made the world, including humanity, perfect, holy and sinless. We believe that man sinned by his own free will and that caused a separation from God. Belief that we as humans are sinful and cannot save ourselves from death and damnation leads us to confess our

sins and seek forgiveness and Baptism. This is not of our own, but through the power of the Holy Spirit. There is but one way to eternal life, and that is thru Jesus Christ, who died on the cross for the redemption of our sins and rose again to defeat death and bring us into that saving grace.

There are no other "truths" or as some are teaching, that if your belief in the god of your choice is sincere, that is your salvation.

Lord have mercy on us and forgive us if we stay silent in our witness. Strengthen us to ask direction for that witness, be it thru speaking, or prayer, or action. Of our own, we confess that we are weak. In our confession we ask...forgive us, renew us and lead us. Along with the whole church of God, Lord, Strengthen us.
